Questions:

How much should we trust opinions? To each one his own truth? What does it mean 'to prove' something? Does modern science enable us to know everything? Should we overcome our illusions?

DOMAIN: **ETHICAL PHILOSOPHY**

THEORIES: Hedonism, Utilitarianism, Deontology

CONCEPTS: Freedom/Determinism Happiness/Duty Values/Facts Relativism/Universalism

Questions:

Is free will compatible with determinism? Is pleasure starting point of happiness? Are we always responsible for our choices? Are good and evil relative? How can we decide an action is just or not?
